## Tradition 4. Long Form.

But when its plans concern the welfare of neighbouring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the General Service Board. On such issues our common welfare is paramount

As always freedom brings responsibility. Because each Group is autonomous, it's up to each group to avoid any action that may harm A.A. And there have been such actions, or this tradition would be unnecessary. "implicit throughout A.A.'s Traditions," Bill W. wrote, "is the confession that our fellowship has its sins, we admit we have character defects as a society and these defects threaten us continually."

Mixed Groups, as long as the group follows A.A.'s guidelines, you can have whatever style of group you like.

But wherever two or more alcoholics are gathered to practice A.A. principles, it is an A.A. group if they say it is.

Like the individual member who chooses to make the Steps his or her guide toward happy sobriety, the wise group recognizes that the Traditions are not hindering technicalities – they are proved guides toward the chief objective of all A.A. groups.....

## Public Information Update

### Treasurer DDO: Pat M

**FINANCIAL REPORT: Summary** At the end of February, we retain a healthy balance (cash and bank account) of \$5,775.67. We recorded a small loss for the month of \$4.71 compared to a surplus of \$382.48 for the same month last year. The difference is attributable lower group donations and literature sales this month and higher expenses (literature purchases). Year to date we are showing a loss of \$1,146.31 and this is expected due to our decision to donate \$2,000 of excess funds to GSO. Otherwise, group contributions and literature sales remain sufficient to cover operating expenses. Petty Cash/Literature Cash Sales The petty cash tin was counted on 26 February at \$63.35. Opening balance \$78.75 and receipts for \$15.40 for tissues, coffee cups and paper towels were found. Hence \$78.75 - \$15.40 = \$63.35. Caroline is now keeping the float to \$50.00 and will advise if this needs to be adjusted.

When I began working the steps with my sponsor, she helped me see my defects, why I was a people pleaser.

Struggling to the top of the heap or hiding underneath.

My handicapped friend moved away I am no longer an actor or in a relationship other than with my Higher Power.

I am grateful, I live in and with myself and I know I am good enough.

Thanks to AA's program for living and my Higher Power I am sober today and through the meetings, the program, a loving sponsor, and an exceptionally large AA family encompassing the world, I am Happy! My gratitude to all the above.

Resentment is the number one offender.

Sobriety is like a house where I store my resentments in the garage.

When I am starting to sort things in my garage, I walk past, and I see it.

I know I need to clean it out.

Do inventory/call sponsor when I can go through it with her.

Steps Cathartic which means (providing psychological relief through the open expression of strong emotions, causing catharsis "Crying is a cathartic release" Similar purging purgative)

If you are cursed enough to be an alcoholic, you might not be blessed enough to find AA.

No one is out of the resentment zone, not because of them, it is because of me.

If I am to do this program and if I am to remain sober, I need to make sure everyone is on that list.

Even if I know I might not get to go over these resentments right away.

When I came into these rooms and gained the design for living, I gained hope.

Hope gave me a desire to live, hope gave me an insight into the happiness I could have in sobriety.

## THE TWELVE STEPS

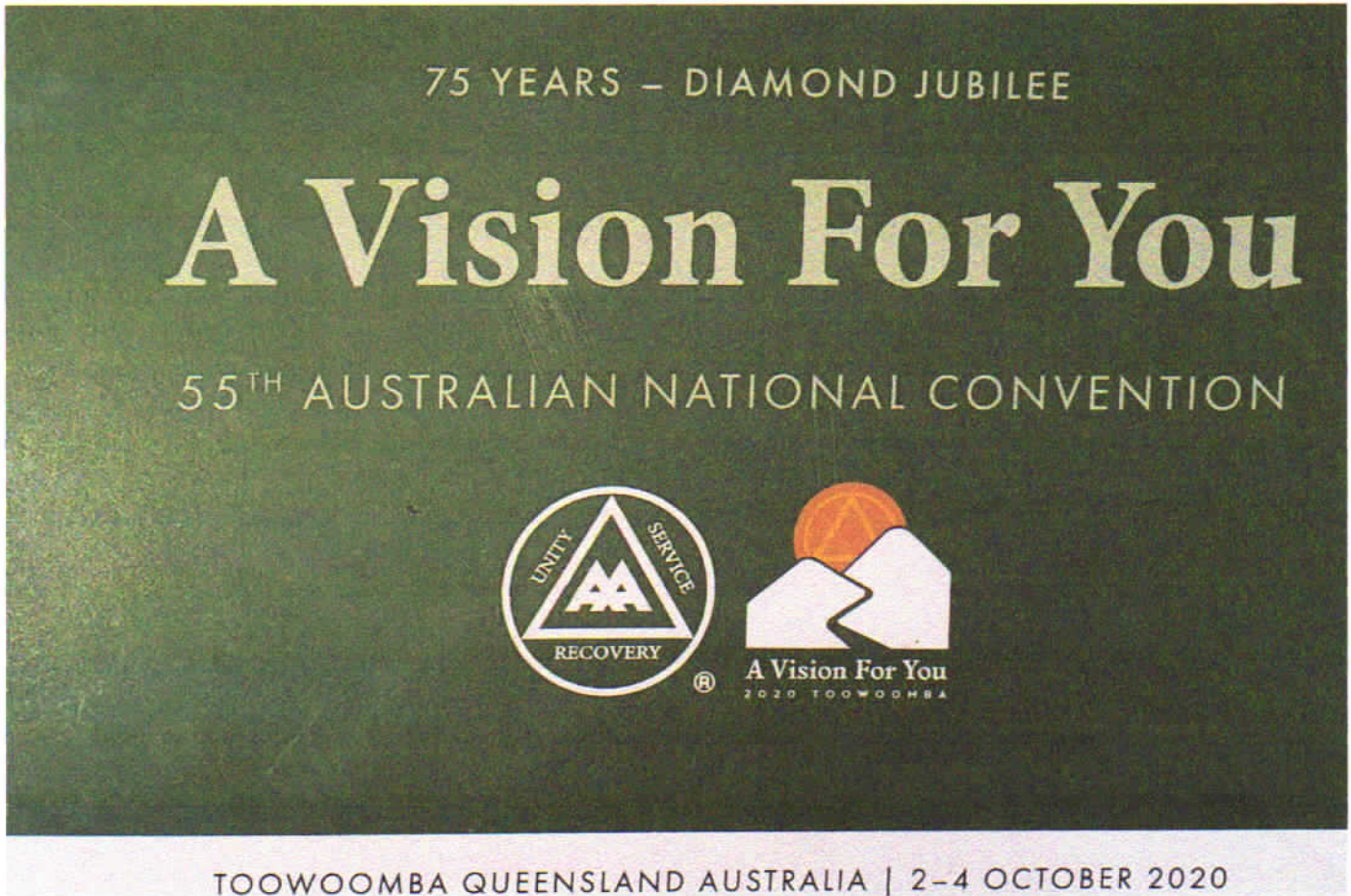
- 1/ We admitted we were powerless over alcohol—that our lives had become unmanageable.
- 2/ Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3/ Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
- 4/ Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- 5/ Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- 6/ Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- 7/ Humbly asked him to remove our shortcomings.
- 8/ Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- 9/ Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- 10/ Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11/ Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12/ Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

## POSITION VACANT

### National Correctional Facilities National Co-Ordinator

#### **THE POSITION**

The term of office is four years, taking effect in 2021.

The new Co-ordinator is appointed by the Chairman of the Trustees' Correctional Facilities Committee, in consultation with the General Service Board.

The responsibilities of the Co-ordinator are:

- To actively encourage and promote the growth of Correctional Facilities activities throughout Australia.
- To act as a positive communication link, through reporting, writing, email, the Service website, displays and the National T&CF Forum, between all parts of the Fellowship with an interest in relevant Service work;
- Be in regular contact with the Chairperson of the Trustees' Correctional Facilities Committee in order to be apprised of Service opportunities;
- Liaise with the Board and General Service Office in seeking or conveying requested Forum-related information, and in implementing national scale projects;
- Send short Reports on main activities and Forum progress (dot points) to the February & July Board meetings via the General Service Office with cc to the Chair of the relevant Trustees' Committee, and report fully to the Board and annual GS Conference in November.
- Publish and distribute a regular newsletter sharing information on AA activities in Correctional Facilities.

#### **NATIONAL FORUM**

- Actively encourage Areas to have Forum hosting bids in for Conference approval two years ahead, to ensure continuity and certainty for maximum benefit to the Fellowship;
- Be a functioning ex officio member of the relevant National Forum Host Planning Committee (HPC): co-ordinate, attend where feasible, receive all minutes, keep in active touch with the HPC and report to the Board;
- Ensure that the Forum is relevant and attractive to the Fellowship in its content and activities;
- See that the Forum as a whole is recorded for posterity;
- Attend the Forum and deliver a report to the Service Fellowship on the past two years' activities in Correctional Facilities, including both successes and shortcomings as seen by the officebearer;
- Act on and follow up any requests of the Forum;
- Ensure that the Forum Program includes a slot for a short explanation and questions on the role of the Co-ordinator; ensure nomination forms for the next Co-ordinator position are available and participants are aware of the this and the deadline of the end of the Forum; convey completed forms to National Office as soon as possible after the Forum.

## NOTES FROM AN EMOTIONAL SOBRIETY SEMINAR

- held on Zoom at the WOMENS INTERNATIONAL MEETING - 27-3-21

(W.I.M. is on Zoom 24x7 - ID- 928-941-485-68 Password - Billw)

The excessive and damaging drinking of alcohol is but one symptom of our disease of Alcoholism.

Alcoholism manifests in us as feeling 'restless, irritable and discontented' p.xxviii, importantly, whether we are drinking or sober.

Of course, putting the drink down is a necessary first step.

Uncovering the reasons behind our addictions is what Emotional Sobriety is getting at and where lasting peace of mind and serenity are promised to exist.

Bill W realised that recovery entailed more than merely stopping our destructive drinking.

For alcoholics and addicts to more fully recover, we need, to the best of our ability, work through all 12 Steps, then continue to 'uncover, discover and discard' the things in ourselves which keep us returning to that place of depression and fear and that recurring sense of futility.

More importantly, we need to discover why we feel, even when sober, a disconnection from God, ourselves, others, and the natural world.

This malaise has killed many of our members.

Bill called emotional sobriety "the next frontier" which means our recovery needs to be about continually enlarging our spiritual life, - once the obsession to drink has been removed by working all 12 Steps.

Dr Harry Tiebout, Bill's psychiatrist (and Marty Mann's), was the first to posit Alcoholism as a disease to the medical profession back in the 1940s.

He drew up a summary of the qualities (character defects), which alcoholics and addicts exhibit in their underlying personalities.

See if you can relate to any of these traits of emotional immaturity.

- I seek approval and lose my identity
- I have difficulty accepting criticism and become threatened and angry when criticised
- I have feelings of abandonment and of not feeling good enough
- I hold emotional pain within and lose touch with my feelings
- I feel unappreciated and that I do not fit in
- I usually feel lonely when surrounded by others
- I fear failure
- I fear rejection and I do not try new things in case I do not do so well
- Nothing and no one are ever good enough for long

Sounds like we don't know who we are or how to be our 'authentic selves'.

We seek purpose and meaning but it eludes us.

Without spiritual help and guidance, we will remain lost souls. Dr Tiebout believes our childish personality traits need to be surrendered before our addiction can be fully arrested.

Within many addicted people he sees a scared or ashamed little boy or girl, who whispers self-defeating thoughts based on a lifetime of negative messages.

We walk through life seeking approval and expecting others and external circumstances to fulfil our needs and fill our emptiness.

Such unwitting expectations cause huge resentments against life and others. "You should fix things for me so I don't have to feel discomfort"

Is there a way out? 'There had better be!' I hear you say!

Next month comrades, I will share the suggested solution, what it means to be an emotionally mature person, the different ways we can overcome our insecurities and how we can grow into the people God intends us to be.

## *History of Alcoholics in Darwin and the*

### *Northern Territory*

#### *Part 8*

31) John J. was invited to a social function during the dry season of 1964. At the time of needing to leave for the event, he was suddenly confronted with the inexplicable impulse to check on Bill S's welfare. So powerful was this urge, he went out to Bill's residence in Nightcliff. Although Bill's station wagon was in the carport and the door open, there was no response to a knock on the door.

32) Sensing that the home was not empty, John climbed the stairway to find Bill flat on the floor with a raging temperature, which was later diagnosed as pneumonia. To manhandle Bill down the stairway and into the rear of his station wagon was a Herculean task. The act of getting Bill admitted into Darwin Hospital had a remarkable bonding effect on the two.

33) John had lent Bill his personal copy of "AA Comes of Age" to help Bill, in any way possible break the tenacious grip of alcoholism. In the January of 1965, (after welcoming another southern sober member into the group, Mike C. from Melbourne), John returned to his home state of Tasmania, after gradually coming to terms with the need to make amends to the string of victims of his own life. Inadvertently, he left behind with Bill his precious "AA Comes of Age".

34) When John next returned to Darwin in 1990, by now married and a father of two and a grandfather of one, he was reunited with Bill S., who returned the precious AA volume, the only item in Bill's possession to survive cyclone Tracy. Such was the loving care taken of the book, apart from the missing dust jacket, it was in immaculate condition. Bill although drinking constantly throughout, proudly declared to John that, because of that bond, he could never have disposed of the book, no matter what happened!

35) AA members who are deprived of the healing process of working with sick alcoholics can only guess at the bond that builds between two individuals –such is the love that holds us together and builds and retains that vital ingredient compassion.

36) Bill and Terry's widows continued to live in the Darwin area, loving friends who lived on the opposite side of one fence, content and happy to be good friends, as their respective husbands were in their peculiar bond of friendship.

37) It is believed Les W., the founding member moved to Cairn's son after Cyclone Tracy tore the heart from Darwin on Christmas Eve, 1975. What stories he could relate were he here with us today!

38) A member called John Reid was living in Darwin during 1972 and 1973. There were three meetings functioning: Monday (St Mary's School); Wednesday Hospital and Nightcliff (St Paul's School) with Cathy D. as Secretary. John says.

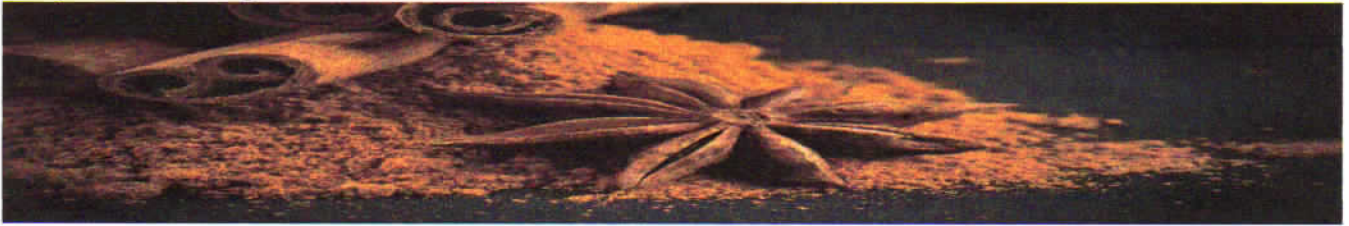
39) "Paul V. was a great support during our time in Darwin. There was a fellow called Viv, who had been dry without AA for many years, a couple of members from the RAAF, a dentist and a local MP who used to come and go. In 1972 we had a Public Information (PI) Meeting there which is still probably the best PI I have ever experienced. The Chief Medical Officer (CMO) from the Hospital, many managers from the then Public Works Department (PWD) {the biggest employer}, Doctors and Religious were there. The Attorney General was a member but moved to W.A. One of the Chiefs of the PWD, Cedric Patterson was a great supporter. We also had support from the Salvation Army, Catholic Church, the Courts, Chief Magistrate (I was on their panel), Police, Bush Baptists, and the Hospital CMO. AA members had virtually 24 hrs access to the Hospital and could 'admit' an alcoholic and the CMO would come around and sign them in when we had the patient bedded down.

40) Around 1973 it was decreed that Aborigines be allowed to drink legally. We had our share of newcomers as a result. However, my sister-in-law, a nurse, told us about the devastation that followed. She had to treat fellows coming back from the pub being hit by cars, going to sleep in drainpipes and becoming totally dehydrated etc. I used to get calls from the Police: 'Could we identify this one or that one who had been picked up with a piece of AA literature on him/her, dead in a ditch. My home phone was also used as the AA contact and we had more AA calls than business and personal calls. We made many trips to Howard Springs (Viv's home) and Berry Springs with 'Newies' on Sundays which was the worst day of the week for idle hands and hyper-active minds. We also had frequent picnics at the beach always including an AA meeting. Although percolated coffee was available at the meetings in 1973 complaints about soggy biscuits motivated John's wife, Carmen, to learn Asian cooking and soon she did a big cook-up for supper after the Saturday meeting. This was later complimented by sweet and sour barramundi at an open house every Thursday evening at their home opposite Casuarina High School. "They came in droves and a good number got sober. Most moved 'Down South'. Darwin was considered the 'drinking capital' of the

World in those days...(so) those keen to get sober and stay sober always considered moving to an area of greater stability" and AA strength. *To be continued next month.*
