Step 9

"Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would harm them or others"

Step Nine is about **Justice**.

Step nine has four categories and one can be creative here. I would always recommend you speak to your sponsor and others before deciding on best approach.

"There will be those who ought to be dealt with just as soon as we become reasonably confident that we can maintain our sobriety.

There will be those to whom we can make only partial restitution, lest complete disclosures do them or others more harm than good.

There will be other cases where action ought to be deferred,

and still others in which by the very nature of the situation we shall never be able to make direct personal contact at all."

Ninth Step Prayer

"Father God, I pray for the right attitude to make my amends, being ever mindful not to harm others in the process. I ask for Your guidance in making indirect amends. Most important, I will continue to make amends by staying abstinent, helping others, and growing in spiritual progress."

The 12 promises

- 1/. We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness.
- 2/. We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it.
- 3/. We will comprehend the word serenity.
- 4/. We will know peace.
- 5/. No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others.
- 6/. That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear.
- 7/. We will lose interest in selfish things and gain interest in our fellows.
- 8/. Self-seeking will slip away.
- 9/. Our whole attitude and outlook on life will change.
- 10/. Fear of people and economic insecurity will leave us.
- 11/. We will intuitively know how to handle situations which used to baffle us.
- 12/. We will suddenly realize that God is doing for us what we could not do for ourselves.

Are these extravagant promises? We think not. They are being fulfilled among us—sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will always materialize if we work for them.

Bill W Camp voted "the best"

These were some of the many positive comments at a group conscience meeting held near the end of the 2024 Bill W Camp last month. The comments came from visitors, a number of them ending up at Douglas Daly after a tag-along which began at Lightning Ridge and finished up at Mount Isa. High praise from veteran "taggers".

More members attended the camp this year than last, notably locals. There were 58 registrations and a rough head count at the Saturday night open meeting found more than 75 there.

We are grateful to the Caring and Sharing Tape Library for again coming this year, recording our AA meetings on USB sticks which had the bonus of meetings recorded on the Lightning Ridge tag-along. The recorders also provided some items for sale and light for Red Faces.

Al-Anon had two meetings, one of which was recorded, and participated in two AA meetings, providing an Al-Anon co-chair.

Those who attended the camp seemed to think we had a good mix of sharing and fellowship including some fun events like the damper competition, the auction (always fun) and Red Faces on Saturday night (which showcased some actual talent). And TB's family again cooked us a delicious barbecue – thanks again to them, carrying on the memory of the camp's founder.

The auction raised an amazing \$882 and members were again very generous with donations, giving us a surplus after expenses of \$592 which was distributed 60:30:10.



WRITING THE BIG BOOK REVIEW
